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# Treating your baby's umbilical granuloma

# What is an umbilical granuloma?

An umbilical granuloma is a piece of tissue that stays on your baby's belly button after the umbilical cord has fallen off. It usually looks like a soft pink or red lump and it may leak a little.

# Why do I need to treat it?

An umbilical granuloma increases the risk of an umbilical infection, which can lead to your baby feeling unwell.

### How can I treat it?

It can be simply and safely treated by applying ordinary household salt.

Apply a small pinch of table or cooking salt to the granuloma and cover it with gauze for 10 minutes. It may help to tuck the gauze into your baby's nappy to keep it in place.

After 10 minutes, gently rinse the salt away using warm water and another piece of gauze.

# How often should I treat the granuloma?

You need to apply the salt treatment twice a day for at least 3 days. Continue until the granuloma heals, If it has not healed after 7 days of treatment, please make an appointment with your GP to check it.

### What should I look for?

You will notice the granuloma gets smaller; it may change colour and become dry and the umbilicus will heal.

If the belly button becomes red or has a discharge, your baby may have an infection and should see a GP, although this is very unusual

## What else can I do?

Try to keep the belly button clean and dry. Let the air get to the area by rolling back the top of the nappy.
