

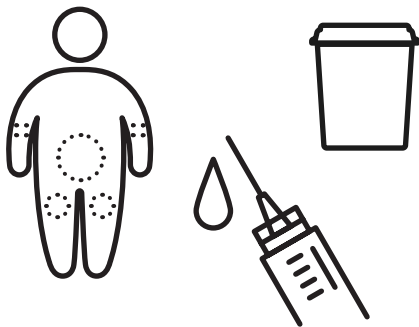
☞ PATIENT INJECTING INSULIN? What to include in your consultation.



CHECK! Have you observed their ...

- Insulin pen
- Blood glucose meter and book
- Insulin passport
- Injection technique

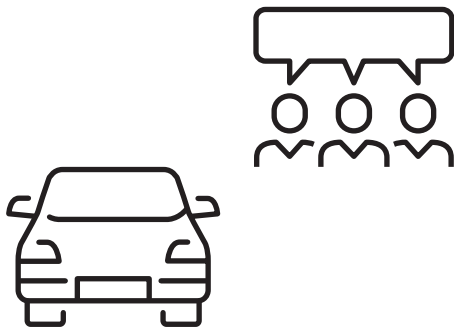
EDEN TOP TIP – Do they need replacing? Is the patient still able to use them safely?



CHANGE! are they ...

- Changing the lancet every test?
- Changing the needle every injection?
- Changing the site every injection?

EDEN TOP TIP – See for yourself! **ALWAYS** look at and feel injection sites. When changing sites due to lipohypertrophy, reduce Insulin to avoid hypoglycaemia.



CHAT! always discuss ...

- Hypos and treatments
- Driving
- Sick day rules

EDEN TOP TIP – **ALWAYS** discuss hypos. **ACT** to prevent them.
