How long have you been a nurse?	10 years
What inspired you to be a nurse?	It was a mix between enjoying science and biology at school and wanting to have a dynamic job where I can help people.
How did you get into this career? What steps did it take since leaving school?	I didn't know much about nursing before applying but I have enjoyed a lot my career so far.
